What is H-SYNC?


Housing Stability for Youth in Courts

- > Created by UW's CoLab in 2019.
- Housing Stability for Youth in Courts (H-SYNC) is a prevention program that represents a state-wide partnership between juvenile courts and local social service providers. The goal of the program is to prevent youth homelessness by utilizing the juvenile court as a pivotal triage point to identify and refer youth and their families to appropriate supportive services, which can include family-based prevention services for those at risk of experiencing homelessness and for those currently experiencing homelessness.
- In H-SYNC, families receive free support from a trained community services Navigator who has in-depth knowledge of resources in your area.

Why H-SYNC?

Research shows that more than 75% of youth experiencing homelessness will have contact with the police, that more than 50% will be arrested, and that 40% of youth screened for court services had a history of housing instability. Thus, the H-SYNC prevention model aims to take advantage of this critical connection point, using routine data flags that already exist in court processes, to identify and automatically refer youth and their families to services tailored to their particular needs. Referrals based on data flags ensure that youth who are risk of homelessness, but who may not show obvious externalizing signs, don't fall through the cracks.



Overview of H-SYNC

H-SYNC is a prevention program that represents a state-wide partnership between juvenile courts, local social service providers, and the University of Washington. The goal of the program is to prevent youth homelessness by utilizing the juvenile court as a pivotal triage point to identify and refer youth and their families in need to appropriate services, including referrals to family-based prevention services for those *at risk of* experiencing homelessness as well as referrals for those *currently experiencing* homelessness.


Overview of youth identification and referral process

- a. The Navigator receives youth referrals directly from court staff (i.e. a JPC).
- b. Court staff members should refer all youth who are flagged based on two PACT items as well as any youth they think may be at risk of or currently experiencing homelessness.



- i. Referrals can be made by sending a completed referral form via e-mail, by calling the Navigator, or by meeting with the Navigator in person (see contact information above). A referral sheet is needed for all youth.
- ii. NOTE: Referrals should be made within 24 hours of identification, but referrals can be made throughout the youth's court involvement.
- a. Navigator will follow-up directly with the youth and may contact court staff for follow-up questions/concerns.

PACT responses that should <u>always</u> result in a referral



Other flags we strongly encourage court staff to refer based on

- a. If a youth complains of the level of fighting or hostility in the home.
- b. If you learn a youth is *currently unhoused* or is unstably housed outside of the PACT
 - i. **Examples:** You find out the youth is living with a friend or family member that is not their immediate guardian, living on the street, living in a homeless shelter, living in a temporary treatment facility, has no current address, etc.
- c. If you learn a youth is at risk of becoming unhoused or unstably housed outside of the PACT
 - **i. Examples:** Youth has high interpersonal conflict in their family, family is about to be evicted, etc.
