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

- parents recognized him as NT at around 2 years
- goes to the store without noise canceling headphones
- florescent lights are not a problem
- struggles to flap but enjoys a good fidget spinner on occasion
- loves eye contact
- lack of skill in certain areas are never pathologized
- never minds a crowd
- always asks you why you're being so quiet
- graduated from public school without ever once being subjected to traumatic therapies, "behavior management" or presumed incompetent



Autism is a "dynamic disability". What this means is capacity & functioning are not concrete & may fluctuate dependent on factors such as environment, cognition, executive function, processing capacity, Interoception/exteroception, neuro-fatigue, anxiety, communication differences, burnout & sensory overwhelm. This means Autistics may be capable of a task one day, but unable to perform the task at another. Neurodiversally Unbroken 2021



It's not Aspergers, it's Autism.

Aspergers was named after the Nazi Hanz Asperger who tortured kids with additional needs to see which of them deserved to die and which could be put to work. Aspergers is just what they call the "put them to work instead of killing them" kind of autistics.

The autistic community is trying to get folk to stop using that term because it's offensive and abelist.

Neurodiversity designed by autistics to represent the diversity of the autistic spectrum






