



#### Lifetime cross-system involvement of CSE Youth

Presented to the King County CSEC Task Force 7/28/17

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### Purpose

- Describe the system involvement of youth identified as commercially sexually exploited or at high risk of CSE by Children's Administration
- Though there is great variability, in general we found that these youth are characterized by:
  - Many referrals to CA, often beginning at an early age, but (relatively) few "founded" referrals
  - Frequent placement changes, crisis treatment and runaway event
  - Early and frequent juvenile detention episodes
  - Difficulty engaging in Bridge Collaborative services



### Administrative Data Sources

- Bridge Collaborative agencies
- King County Juvenile Court
- Children's Administration
- Washington State Center on Court Research



### Methods

- ▶ 83 youth were identified by Children's Administration in DSHS Region 2 (King, Everett, Skagit, Whatcom, San Juan, and Island Counties). CSEC youth only identified in other regions are not included in this sample.
- Some youth were already engaged in services when identified, others were newly referred, and others were unable to be located (on the run)
- Data from Children's Administration linked to data provided by Bridge Collaborative, Washington Center on Court Research, and King County Juvenile Court







### Placement pattern for early placed youth

- Of the 16 youth who were placed before the age of six:
  - ▶ II of them (69%) achieved placement stability--Did not reenter care for 7 or more years
    - ▶ 10 of these 11 youth were reunified with their parents after the first early placement
  - ▶ 2 (12.5%) remained in care for their lifetime





# Number of Unique Youth Detained by County




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


## Detention Admission for All King County Detention Episodes – Original Offense

# Bridge Collaborative Referrals and Services

## Referrals to Bridge Collaborative

Youth with referral received by BC	46 (55.4%)
Youth who were enrolled in BC	25 (30.1%)
Youth who exited BC	16 (64% of those enrolled)
Avg. number of days enrolled in BC before exiting	215 (Range: 46-610)



### Youth 1: No BC services






## Youth 2: Lack of BC service engagement
